I bred Matilda in 2008 to Ch
Buttonwood Stone Cliff True Grit
(Stetson), owned by Traci Stinzcum, and
picked my puppy who I called Quinn. I
really liked the litter and began to plead
with Rebecca to let me breed Matilda
one more time. She was reluctant
because she missed her while she was
with me. Lucky for me, Rebecca found
out she was pregnant and was so busy
with her new baby that she didn't have
time to miss Matilda. So I bred her back
to Stetson.


Matilda didn't have any issues whelping her second litter until the third

puppy. She pushed and pushed, but that puppy just wouldn't come out. I tried to help Matilda, but the puppy stayed just

out of reach.

Finally, I loaded
Matilda into the
car and went to the
emergency vet's
clinic. Poor
Matilda grunted

stubborn puppy
out. When we
arrived, as I
walked her through
the door that



Almost from the first the puppy with the red string stood out to me. When Red String was hungry she would flip over onto her back. She would nurse upside down. She also talked a lot while she nursed.

Her intelligence blew me away from the beginning. She was the first to open her eyes, walk, bark and escape from the whelping box. In fact, it became almost impossible to keep her in the box and later the puppy pen. I would hear Matilda whine in the middle of the night, so I would get up and search

the house for red string puppy. Most of the time she was in the living room either playing with toys or sleeping on the dog beds. Sometimes she would be rolling around on her back and yapping while talking to herself.

When it was time to wean I put a water dish in the puppy pen. Yep, you guessed it. Red String puppy would most likely be in the water dish, playing and splashing. I once found her sleeping upside down in the dish with a contented little smile on her adorable puppy face.

Trying to outsmart this puppy. I switched out the water dish for a couple of those rabbit bottles. They were recom-

mended to me by other breeders who had dish swimmers.

One morning when I went into the dining room to feed the pups, I found Miss Red String sitting in the middle of a giant puddle. The lick-it tube was laying at her feet, allowing the water bottle to leak out all over my dining room floor. The puppy was quite proud of herself. She saw me and immediately started talking at

me. If a puppy could laugh, that one was laughing that day. I couldn't help the snort of laughter that escaped from me.

What a stinker!

I loved her sass. I tend to keep the sassy, bad puppies. How could I not keep that puppy? I named her Raven.

Needless to say, Raven took to water like a fish. She swam without hesitation the first time she went to the lake with the older dogs. She was retrieving, usually to hand, by the end of that summer.

Raven's first show was at the Labrador Owner's Club in June of 2011. She won her Sweeps class under breeder-judge Roger Bannister (Greenhill) and

placed in the regular classes. When she moved around the ring she glided, and I could just see her saying, "Look at me!" as she moved.

In August of that year I drove Quinn and Raven to British Columbia. We stayed with my friend Cathy Mitchell (Duckndogs). We showed at the BCLRC and I was thrilled that

Raven placed 2nd in one of her classes. That summer was one of the hottest on record in Michigan with numerous days climbing to over 90°. Raven was bald. The other dogs were still all in coat since their climate is much cooler than ours. The judge recognized Raven's quality anyway and rewarded her for it, despite the lack of coat. Quinn and Raven also won the Brace class that day as my full sisters both moved beautifully as we went around the ring. That was a proud "breeder's moment" for me.

Over Labor Day 2011 I took Quinn to Canada. She needed just one point to finish. I decided to enter Raven as well, to see what she would do. I didn't expect anything from her, she was basically along for the ride. Well, little sister Raven had something to say about that. Raven won Winner's Bitch, Best of Winners, Best of Breed and Group 3 under breeder-judge Carl Liepmann (Triple L), who had nothing but good things to say about her. Poor Quinn had to settle for Reserve Winners Bitch that day. I kept Raven home the next day and Ouinn went on to finish her Championship.


Raven then went on a tear, finishing her Canadian Championship in eight shows at age sixteen months. I took her to a couple of UKC shows a few weeks later and she finished her UKC Championship in a weekend, going up over dogs who were older and already had their Championships and Grand Championships.

2012 was a slow year for us. I had a tear in my rotator cuff surgically repaired, so we only earned one title that year, her WC.

When I started doing field work with Raven she had a horrible habit of not wanting to wait until released to retrieve her bird. She would throw her head around, losing her mark. It took us quite

a while to break that habit. I was proud of her when, going for her WC, she sat, watching intently as the ducks fell, without throwing her head. She raced out to her ducks and retrieved them to hand.

In 2013 we started doing some obedience and rally, after I had additional shoulder surgery to repair a torn bicep tendon. She earned ten titles that year: four rally, two obedience, her CGC and the Canadian equivalent (CGN), one field and her UKC Grand Championship.

I bred Raven in January of 2014.

My plan was to breed her to MBISS GCh Can Ch Paradoc's Obsidian (Sid), owned by Karen and John Helmers. I had fallen in love with this dog the first time I saw him. Unfortunately, when Raven was ready to be bred, we had 17 inches of snow. Karen had over

22 inches of snow in Indiana, and there was no

way she could get semen to FedEx. Thankfully, Nicole McCarthy (Piccadilly) had a stud dog I liked, a 4 x 4 Jeep, and lived only an hour away. Nicole jumped in her Jeep with BISS Ch Banner's No

Line On The Horizon (Fez) and we did a breeding to cover Raven. Karen was able to get Sid's semen out the next day and so I did a dual breeding when it arrived.

Raven had nine puppies in March of that vear. Through DNA testing it was determined that there were eight puppies sired by Fez and one female that belonged to Sid. Before I had the DNA results back. I was drawn to a little female with a bit of white on her chest. She reminded me a lot of baby Raven, repeatedly climbing out of the puppy pen and full of sass. I ended up keeping her, naming her Bran

which is raven in Gaelic. She was the one Sid puppy.

After the pups were weaned and I got her back into shape, Raven went back to work. She earned eight titles in 2014 including her JH, American and Canadian CD and numerous advanced rally titles. One of these advanced rally titles was her UROC (United Rally Obedience Champion). In order to earn this she had to Double Qualify in Rally 2 (Advanced) and Rally 3 (Excellent) with scores of 91 and above (100 is a perfect score in rally). She had to earn 100 points based on a point scale with her scores. Raven never scored less than the 91 points she needed in order to earn a point towards her UROC. She had several 100s along the way, including three High In Trials.

After Raven had earned her UROC we set our sights on UKC's UROG, or

United Rally Obedience Grand
Championship. To achieve that, we had
to have fifteen Double Qs (Double
Qualifying scores) in Rally 2 and Rally 3
with a combined score of 192 or above.
This title was going to take some time
since I ended up injuring my knee in
early 2015 and had surgery in the summer of that year.

In 2015 we were also introduced to Barn Hunt. I had wanted to give Raven a bit of diversity, so she wasn't just doing rally. She earned both her RATI (Instinct) and her RATN (Novice Barn Hunt title). She enjoyed doing Barn Hunt, but her most favorite thing about it was getting

to jump around on the bales of straw. She had quite a vertical jump and leaped from bale to bale, laughing and wagging her tail the whole time. Some days it was hard to get her to concentrate on finding the rats instead of jumping on all the bales.

In the spring of 2015 I bred Raven back to Sid.
Unfortunately, she didn't get pregnant. I was so disappointed. I'm hopeful she will be pregnant with Sid pups in 2016.

Raven also earned several advanced rally titles in 2015, including her URX (UKC equivalent to the AKC RAE) and her AKC RE (Rally Excellent). In late 2015 we were introduced to nosework. Oh my, did Raven love that! At her very first NW trial she earned her Novice Container title. In UKC they use the scent birch in the novice division, and hide the scent in one of eight boxes put down on the ground. The same weekend, she also earned her Novice Interior title, where she had to find the birch scent where the judges had hidden it in an "interior" setting.

Her grand total of titles earned in 2015 was eight, including her Advanced Working Certificate test that we received

from the Winnebago LRC. In that test she had to do a double retrieve on land and another double retrieve in the water. Teaching Raven doubles was an adventure. It had been years since I had taught a dog how to retrieve doubles. I knew the training for it had changed, so I tried to find someone to help make sure we were doing it correctly. Unfortunately, I wasn't able to find anyone to help us, so I bought a book. I laugh about it now. I have

dyslexia and have never read instructions in my life. If I have a project that comes with instructions, I usually wing it.

Through trial and error, I manage to get through the project. Raven and I kinda did that with learning doubles.

One of the things in the WCX or AWC, as some clubs call it, the dog must heel quietly from the last blind to the line. Then the dog must stay, as first one duck is thrown, then the second duck, marking both of them. They can only retrieve them one at a time when the judge gives you the release word. They have to remember where the ducks are as they retrieve one, then go back out and retrieve the other.

We had a hard time with that,

despite all the obedience and rally we had done. Many times she focused so hard on one bird she forgot where the second was located. Or she became so excited when the birds fell she would take off, despite my telling her to stay.

We started in my backyard, then moved onto longer marks with the help of friends who threw the ducks for us. It was a long process before she nailed her first double. Several times we would have to go back to singles then try a double again. I literally jumped up and down after her first success as she returned to me with the duck in her mouth, her tail wagging the whole time.

In early 2016 I was notified by AKC

Raven and her son Hank, SC AI NE PTS UCH URO1 Kelrobin Cormac CGCA RATN WC (sired by BISS CH Banner's No Line On The Horizon), owned by Alison and Joe Weber, earning their RATN

that Raven had qualified for the AKC Rally National Championships being held in Tulsa in March. She had qualified for her work in Rally Excellent with high scores. All of her scores were over 90 points, which was the minimum qualifying score to be eligible for the National. Raven's normal score is 95 and above. I also received notification that Raven was named a UKC Rally All-Star for her work in Rally 2 and Rally 3, again due to her scores.

Unfortunately, I was scheduled for a total knee replacement in February 2016, so I wasn't able to take Raven to Tulsa. The surgery ended up being cancelled and I decided to postpone the surgery until fall. Raven and I still had things to do. She is half way to her AKC RAE with five Double Qs. I hope to make it to the 2017 AKC Rally Nationals for her work towards her RAE.

In March of 2016 I took Raven to a UKC show where she picked up two nosework titles and the last leg in the grueling UROG. She earned a score of 99 in the Rally 3 class and then scored a

perfect 100 in the Rally 2 class and a High In Trial. She finished her UROG in style. I was so proud of my Blackbird that I had to hold back tears. What a brave, smart, determined little dog she is.

I knew Raven was going to be something special from the moment she was born. She exceeded my every dream. Her only limitation is me as her handler. All of her titles and wins are

owner/amateur handled. Whatever is asked of her, she tries her very best to do. Sometimes it's not pretty, but she presses on. At times she's too smart for her own good. As we prepare to either step into the ring or up to the line in the field, I remind her to not think too much. "Listen to me," I tell her. "Don't think for yourself." Sometimes she listens and sometimes she doesn't.

We'll continue to do things as long as she continues to enjoy what we are doing. She's really into the nosework stuff right now. I'd like to get a tracking title on her, if we can find a class to get us started. I would also like to get her CDX and possibly UD, if I can convince her I'm not mad at her when I don't talk to her during the exercises. She much prefers rally since I can talk to her while in the ring.

I think she's capable of getting a Senior Hunter. However, I've never trained for one, so I'm not sure it will be possible, since I can't find anyone again to help us. Maybe I can try and read a book.

Raven has passed on her intelligence and trainability to her puppies. Her daughter, Bran, has taken to nosework and might actually end up better at it

than Raven. (Shhhh, don't tell Raven I said that.) Bran has her UKC Championship and went Best of Breed and Group 3 at her first Canadian show, just like her mother. Unfortunately it's hard for me to run with the knee, so finishing her up in conformation might not happen for a while, if ever. One of Raven's sons has titles in nosework, conformation, field and rally.

Raven is such a silly girl at times. When she was a puppy at her first show, I let her sit on my lap. Six years later, she still sits on my lap at shows. People laugh and point at her sitting calmly as we watch what is going on. She's been photographed many times while sitting on my lap.

She still collapses on her back when she's hungry. She starts about an hour before feeding time, coming to the room

tell people she has Hunger Induced Collapse or HIC. She squeezes her eyes shut and moans every so often to remind me that she hasn't eaten in months. When I glance over at her I catch her looking at me, then she shuts her eyes again quickly when caught.

There are times when Raven has something to say. She'll grab a toy, tail wagging so quickly that her butt wiggles. Sometimes it's a short conversation, other times she talks for quite a while. When she's done she'll drop the toy and go lie down. She's still full of sass.
